On her first day, many people were there. Some people did not want Ruby to go. They held signs in protest. The president sent U.S. Marshals. They kept her safe.

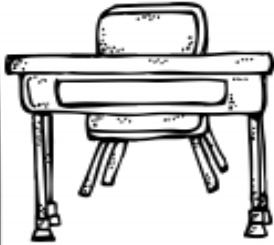
Ruby finished school. She worked for many years. She started the Ruby Bridges Foundation. It teaches values. The values are respect, tolerance, and appreciation of differences.
