Did you know that a moose is a type of deer? Most people can recognize a moose from its large antlers, but not many people realize that only male moose actually have antlers. Moose eat small shrubs and pinecones, and sometimes also moss. Moose sometimes wade into water to eat plants that grow there as well. Moose are herbivores; they do not eat other animals. Many people don't realize that moose are actually good at swimming as well. On land, moose can run up to 35 miles per hour. Moose have hooves that help them walk in mud or snow. Newborn moose calves typically weigh about 30 pounds. A fully grown moose can weigh up to 1,800 pounds. They generally stand about five or six feet tall.



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

It explains the main laws of a country and how its government works. That means that the U.S. Constitution states the basic laws of the United States and explains how the U.S. government works.<sup>2</sup>


