

## ELEMENTS OF DRAMA VOCABULARY FOCUS WALL



Script: the text of the play

Cast of Characters: all of the characters, usually portrayed by actors

Narrator: the person who tells what happens during the play

Setting: the time and place in the play

Act: a chapter in a play that contains more than one scene

Scene: the action that take place in a single setting

Dialogue: the words said by the characters

Stage Directions: written instructions telling the actors what to do

# \STAGE \

Stage directions are written instructions for actors.

## SCRIPT

The script is the written "book" for the actors.

# DIALOGUE

The dialogue is what the actors say

to each other

# **ACTORS**The actors are the

characters in a drama.

of a live audience.

Scenes in a drama show the changes in settings

over time.

#### <u>Setting</u>

A small house in a forest. A forest backdrop and a house backdrop with a curtain for a door.

#### Props

A heavy sack, a gold ring, 4 stools, a small table, and a fine cloak

#### Costumes

Human characters wear medieval-style clothes. Animal characters wear animal masks and fur coverings.

#### ACT 1 Scene 1

(Forest backdrop. Stool at down-right of stage. Lights up full. NARRATOR enters from left and sits on the stool.)

NARRATOR: Once upon a time in Italy, there was a boy named Gigi.

(GIGI enters from left and walks to center stage.)

NARRATOR: Gigi lived in a little house with his mother. One day, though, Gigi decided to go and see the world.

(Offstage) GIGI'S MOTHER: Gigi! Where are you going?

(GIGI'S MOTHER enters from left.)

GIGI'S MOTHER: Gigi! Why are you leaving me?

GIGI: Mama, I want to see the world and seek adventure, and fortune, and stuff.

GIGI'S MOTHER: Gigi! My heart is breaking!

GIGI: Don't worry, Mama! It's not like I'm going to get stuck on top of a mountain. That would just be silly! Before you know it, I'll be back with fine clothes and a bag of gold, and we can live happily ever after.

#### <u>PROLOGUE</u>

STORY TELLER: (Enters from stage left) Many snows have come and gone since this story was first told. My people, the Miwok, live in California – some in what is now called Yosemite Valley. We tell stories of the old days, when animal people lived in the valley. One story begins with MOTHER GRIZZLY going to the river to catch fish for herself and her cubs (Exits).

#### Scene 1

rTING: A forest and mountain, stage left; open sky dotted h clouds, stage right. Blue cloth or painted cardboard oss the front of the stage suggests a river.

OTHER GRIZZLY enters from stage left, holding a fish busket, and stands on the riverbank. Her cubs, YOUNGER BROTHER and OLDER BROTHER, enter and begin to play in the "water.")

OLDER BROTHER (Laughing and splashing): Don't be afraid of a little water, Younger Brother!


YOUNGER BROTHER (Splashing back): I'm not, Older Brother!

MOTHER GRIZZLY (Scolding): Children! Stop scaring away the fish, or we will have nothing to eat. Out of the water, nont! (They obey but manage a last splash or two.) I want you to gather berries — but stay close and do not go downriver. Strange things happen there.

(MOTHER GRIZZLY moves to stage left; the CUBS move to stage right, while playing and pushing each other. A berry bush appears.)

OLDER BROTHER: Look at these berries (He picks them and eats them greedily.) They are so sweet. Taste them!
